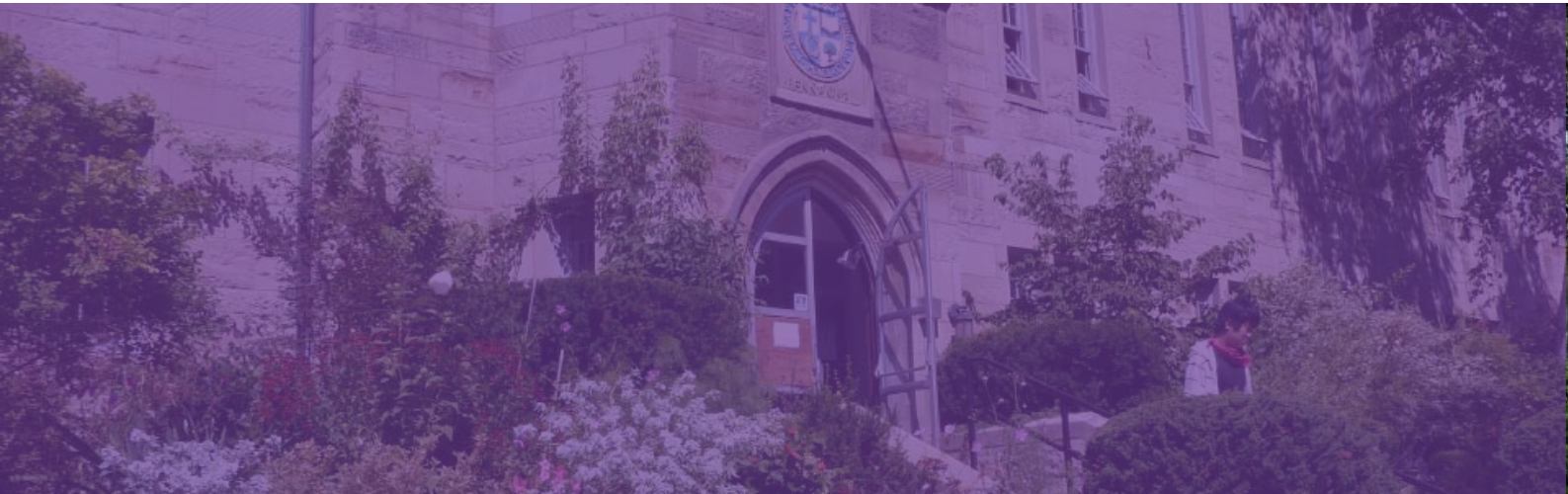

BRIEF III

3.1 WHAT IS A POLICY BRIEF?

A policy brief is a concise and clear summary and proposal related to particular issues within the sociopolitical field. Policy briefs serve as a) a medium for exploring and determining the most pertinent causes and components within relevant issues impacting citizens and b) a vehicle for presenting policy advice and solutions on how to respond to the issue. Policy briefs should be topical, short, and clearly focused on one specific subject. The goal of UTP is to provide students with the opportunity to critically think about the issues that are impacting Canadians and determine possible solutions that will help remedy the issue.

3.2 POLICY BRIEF OUTLINE

The brief must provide a solution to the problem introduced in the prompt (prompts will be announced for each stream on Thursday, March 10, 2022).

Briefs must be a maximum of four pages double-spaced (excluding references). Please ensure that you use a 12-point font and Times New Roman. Each section should be separated with a header (subheaders are not required).

All policy briefs must include the following sections:

Title

Titles should be short (12 words or under) and a clear indicator of what your brief will be about. Titles do not have to be excessively creative and participants do not have to spend a significant period of time creating a title; however, participants should ensure that their title is reflective of the topic and of the solution they are presenting.

Executive Summary

The executive summary is the first substantive part of the brief that your audience will read and serves as a hook to persuade judges that your brief is effective and valuable. Executive summaries are short (one paragraph) and should provide a clear description of the problem and relevant information on a) why the current approach to the issue should be resolved and b) your policy recommendations. The executive summary serves as a concise summary of your brief; please ensure that you clearly indicate why the issue is important to address and what your proposed recommendations are.

BRIEF III

3.2 POLICY BRIEF OUTLINE CONT'D

Introduction

Introductions present the audience with a) the problem, b) background and context of the problem, and c) causes of the problem. Introductions are meant to provide readers with details regarding how the issue manifested, the components of the issue, and any relevant political, social, geographic, and economic contextual factors, and all relevant stakeholders. You are encouraged to provide examples of current policy responses that are ineffective.

Approach & Results

Participants must conduct research on the issue within their relevant stream and present findings directly connected to the issue and to their proposed recommendations. The Research Findings section should include:

1. A summary of the methodology being employed to approach the issue
2. an analysis of research findings relating to the issue, current policy approaches, and the efficacy or ineffectiveness of current policy approaches

Participants must ensure that there is a clear link between their research findings and proposed recommendations. Participants are encouraged to incorporate different viewpoints and counterarguments, and to consider why current policy approaches are/are not working.

Implications & Recommendation

In the final section, participants must provide:

1. a clear breakdown of 1-3 specific recommendations, measures, and practical steps that should be taken to implement the proposed solution
2. implications of the policy recommendations: include details on how the recommendations will improve the situation, potential benefits and costs, and potential side effects

Please ensure that your proposed recommendations are clearly connected to your research findings and are relevant, credible, and feasible. Consider the potential disadvantages of your recommendations and identify any additional costs that it may incur.

Please include a clear conclusion to your brief, with a reiteration of the issue, your proposed recommendations, and a clear summary of why and how your recommendations will improve the situation.

BRIEF III

3.2 POLICY BRIEF OUTLINE CONT'D

Conclusion

This section should be used to wrap up all of the major points discussed in each of your sections of the policy brief. You should express yourself using strong assertions and use data to back up your argument. The ideas presented in this section should be balanced and defensible. What is most important is that you write in a compelling manner and convince the audience that your brief is the best solution.

References

While writing your brief, please ensure that all your information is cited using relevant sources. You may use any citation format, as long as it is consistent. At the end of your brief, you must include a reference page listing all your sources in the same format as your citations.

Please write your brief for politicians who are involved in the field but not necessarily informed on this matter. Your brief should include references to academic and professional language; however, refrain from being unnecessarily complex.

4.1 SUBMITTING THE BRIEF

SUBMISSION FORM

Please read the following instructions carefully. Failure to adhere to the submission instructions will cause your brief not to be considered for awards.

All policy briefs are due at 11.59PM EST on Saturday, March 11, 2023. Late submissions will not be accepted. Due to the nature of the judging process, we are unable to provide extensions of any kind.

Please read the following instructions carefully. Any submissions that do not abide by our submission guidelines may be disqualified from consideration.

- Submissions must be sent to [this form](#).
- All teams and participants must submit one policy brief per team via this Google Form. Please do not submit more than one policy brief per team.
- All policy briefs must be submitted as PDF.
- **PLEASE name your document using the following format:** Stream ID# (EX: Human Rights 104858095).
- **DO NOT** include any personal information, including name or university, except for your identification number on the document.

4.2 JUDGING PROCESS

UTP has invited U of T professors and industry professionals for each stream to judge submitted policies based on a designed rubric that will be made available to all participants during the process. Judges will grade each brief, and UTP will rank the briefs in a stream according to the total points given. Participants will remain anonymous.

On Sunday, March 12, 2023, participants will speak directly to judges on their policy briefs in a Q&A Period. Each team or individual for their stream and be granted 10 minutes each to speak with judges; 5 minutes will be provided to participants to summarize the brief, while the remaining 10 minutes will be granted for judges to ask questions or clarify the content of the brief.

Please see the schedule from Section 2 for detailed judging schedule. Each team or participant will be granted 15 minutes within the time period for their stream period; the timeslot for each time is outlined in Section 2.

Judges will be asked to use the judging session to inform their decision, although the majority of the judging process will rely on the quality of the written brief.

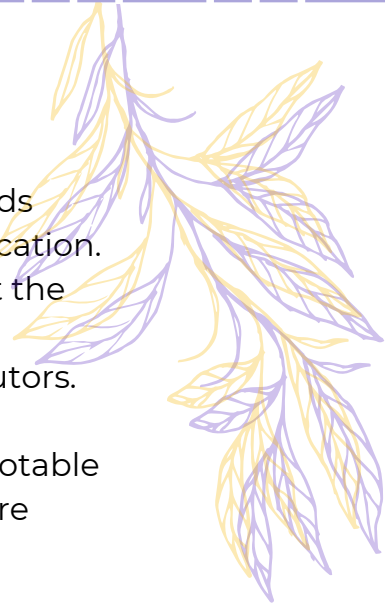

SUBMISSION IV

4.3 AWARDS

The highest graded team from each stream will receive an awards package. Briefs may also be submitted to U of T journals for publication. If judges find an exceptionally well-written brief, UTP will support the team in forwarding the brief to a real policymaker. UTP will also send out certificates and honourable mentions for notable briefs that did not get the highest mark. All participating teams are encouraged to include their experience in their resume/ CV.



5.1 EQUITY POLICY

Policython is the first and only event of its kind in Canada, and welcomes students of all backgrounds from the University of Toronto, with the goal of fostering a fruitful and rewarding academic experience. UTP strives to promote rigorous academic debate and critical thinking by selecting challenging, enlightening, and diverse topics within each policy stream and pushing students to challenge dominant views surrounding current socio-political issues.

Participants who submit policy briefs which breach the Equity Handbook will be subject to a warning and will be asked to change the policy brief in accordance with UTP's equity standards. If the member refuses to change their policy brief or it is not changed within 24 hours, the team or individual will be disqualified from the competition with no refund.

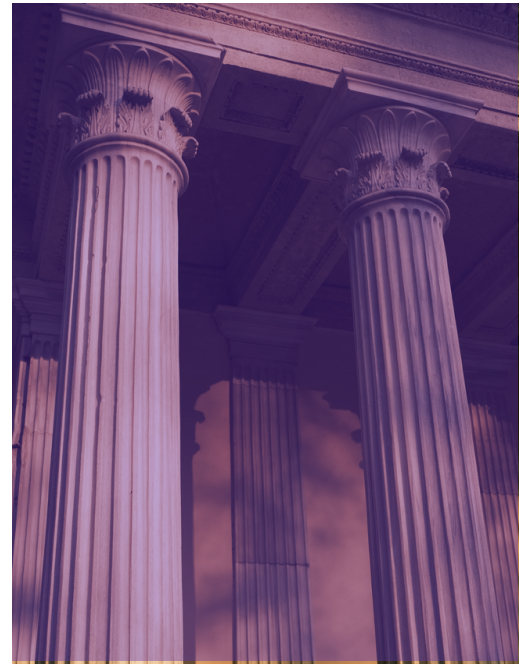

5.2 EQUITY CHECKS

UTP Equity Commissioners ensure that our Equity Policy is followed. You will be asked to submit a draft of your policy brief throughout the event to ensure that it abides by our Equity Policy.

At 3:00PM EST on Friday, March 11, 2023, all participants are expected to submit their drafts for an Equity Check.



Please share a Google Doc containing a draft of your policy brief with equity.uoftp@gmail.com by Friday, March 11, 2023 at 3:00PM EST. During the Equity Check, the Equity Team will take a look at the draft and ensure that none of the content violates the Equity Policy.

This does not have to be the same file that you submit, nor will we be checking for formatting or the quality of the brief. This will not be considered as material to be judged and if your brief is incomplete or erroneous, it will not affect your final results. The Equity Commissioners will simply be assessing the briefs to ensure that none of the content violates the Equity Handbook. Failure to do so will result in a potential disqualification. If material on the Google Doc shared with us violates our Equity Policy, UTP will be reaching out to you/your team.
